Join Rotary!

August is Rotary International's Membership and New Club Development Month - what better time for each of us to imagine how we can make our clubs stronger, tell our stories better, and introduce new people to our world of fellowship and community service.

One of RI President Jennifer Jones requests is for districts to grow membership by increasing the number of club members and by creating two new club models - like the satellite clubs we have in place in Stone Mountain and Roswell, for example. She also would like to see women represent 30% of our total membership by Rotary year end; here in District 6900 we are already at 29.1%!

There are several avenues for assistance on finding new members. Rotary sends leads to the district that come in through RI's website, and the district passes them along to the clubs. The Rotary Learning Center which has courses and suggestions to improve your club membership, including:

- A questionnaire to help your club develop strategies to increase membership participation as well as membership.
- An Online Membership Leads course that shows how a prospect experiences the membership leads process, and how club and district leaders can create a consistent, positive experience for prospective members.
- A Club Health Check to identify a club's problem areas and make changes to stay relevant for the membership and the community.
- Many other courses which can assist in increasing membership.

The Zone 33-34 website (rizon33-34.org) offers another avenue for getting information on membership. This year, RI Director Jeremy Hurst is working with the Regional Coordinators to present MAP - Membership Action Plan. [Visit the Zone website page on membership](#) and watch the MAP introductory video, then sign up to attend sessions September 12 at 5:00 pm - "Connect with Prospects" and October 10 at 6:00 pm - "Meaningful Onboarding."

The third way is to work with District Membership Chair David Schwickerath. His team created the Facebook ad that's shown here - from a photo taken at RI Convention in Houston. David is planning a Membership Summit on August 20 at the Atlanta Motor Speedway, Hampton. The summit will begin at 10:00 am. He will talk about the latest ideas and resources to help you with your membership plans. David is also available to assist you throughout the year as you look for new ways to increase membership.

Our Rotary Foundation at Work

Where Did the Money Go in 2021-22?



We encourage you to keep donating to The Rotary Foundation (TRF) - and we share information along the way about some of our projects - but we wanted to give you access to reports show [what TRF allowed us to do in 2021-22 in our communities](#) - and what we did and continue to do on the [five Global Grant projects approved in 2021-22](#). On the Global Grant side, last Rotary year, District 6900 invested \$292,545 DDF of your generous Rotarian foundation donations to support international projects selected by individual District 6900 Clubs, and groups of clubs, to build better futures for us all. Our global grant activities were supported by more than 35 D6900 clubs. The five grants reflected Clean Water & Sanitation, Literacy, Disease Prevention and Economic Development areas of focus. District 6900 GG DDF Funds also funded 2 Global Grant Scholarships for postgraduate studies in Peace and Conflict Resolution and Disease Prevention. Additionally D6900 hosted a student from Japan who is in the US studying Public Health.

"Doing Good Globally" allowed D6900 Rotarians to touch and change the lives of 28,583 people around the world. and support projects valued at more than \$750,469.00. Thanks to everyone involved, over 28,000 lives were changed last year at an average cost of \$10.23 per person. Thanks to all of you, Doing Good in the World continues to inspire us all. Some simple facts about how we got the money for 2021-22:

1. All money was given to TRF by generous Rotarians in District 6900 during Rotary Year 2018-2019.
2. TRF invested the donations for two to three years, using the earnings plus 5% for foundation operation.
3. After three years, TRF returns the remaining donated funds to District 6900 in two ways: A) 50% of the funds are sent to the District as District Designated Funds (DDF) and used to fund District and Global Grants, and B) 50% goes to the TRF World Fund to be used to match District 6900 DDF \$1 for \$1 inside Global Grants.

District 6900 is allowed to set aside 3% of their annual DDF funds for administrative expenses and up to 20% of the funds for "Contingency Expenses (for things requiring funding that were unanticipated at the time the grant application was submitted). We do this each year and, at Rotary year end, donate all funds remaining unspent to Polio eradication.

RYLA Update

2022 RYLA Was a Blast!



Summertime in District 6900 mean it's time for the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards, better known as RYLA!! RYLA is designed for young adults with proven leadership ability and a commitment to community service. The District 6900 RYLA camp was hosted by the **Rotary Club of Americus** and held June 18-22 on the campus of Georgia Southwestern State University and included 82 students sponsored by over 30 clubs. This year was also the first RYLA gathering since 2019, so the RYLA Family of counselors had a great reunion!

Through RYLA, these young people from different backgrounds - home, educational, religious, and lifestyle - are brought together to work, learn, and discuss the issues that exist within their generation. They have the chance to learn and challenge themselves through team activities, large group activities, and candid, round-table discussions. RYLA programming includes individual personality profiles, conflict resolution styles, and ropes course activities designed to encourage teamwork, communication, and trust. Included once again was the opportunity to participate in a service project which allowed the students to experience the Rotary motto of "Service Above Self" firsthand - the group painted inspirational "RYLA Rocks" to be placed around the campus.

One of the recurring themes of RYLA is the student who accomplishes a feat he/she would have never dared to imagine before coming to camp. The most memorable of these culminating events are always the board break, which allows students to break through their fears to reach their goals, and the Trust Fall from a 5-foot platform into the waiting arms of teammates. And just as always, most of the students who were very hesitant to spend the weekend with 100 strangers became the friends who did not want to part

ways at the end. This speaks volumes to the benefit of RYLA and the positive changes it can create in young lives.

Even more telling of the long-lasting influence of RYLA is the fact that 90% of the counselors were once RYLA participants themselves - they believe in it enough to commit the time and energy to make RYLA the best experience possible. Approximately 67 Rotarians assisted with RYLA in some capacity, with most contributing on the club level with the nomination and selection of student participants while others provided transportation to and from RYLA, and the brave few who agreed to serve as chaperones in the dorms. Special guests this year were DG George Granade and DGE Andre Marria who joined us for several days volunteering as Chaperones and spending time with the student teams.

RYLA aims to help students discover their potential and develop the skills needed to be leaders in their communities, careers, and everyday lives. And they achieve these goals while having fun, building friendships, and creating memories that will last a lifetime. We're already looking forward to 2023 and we hope to see you and your students there!

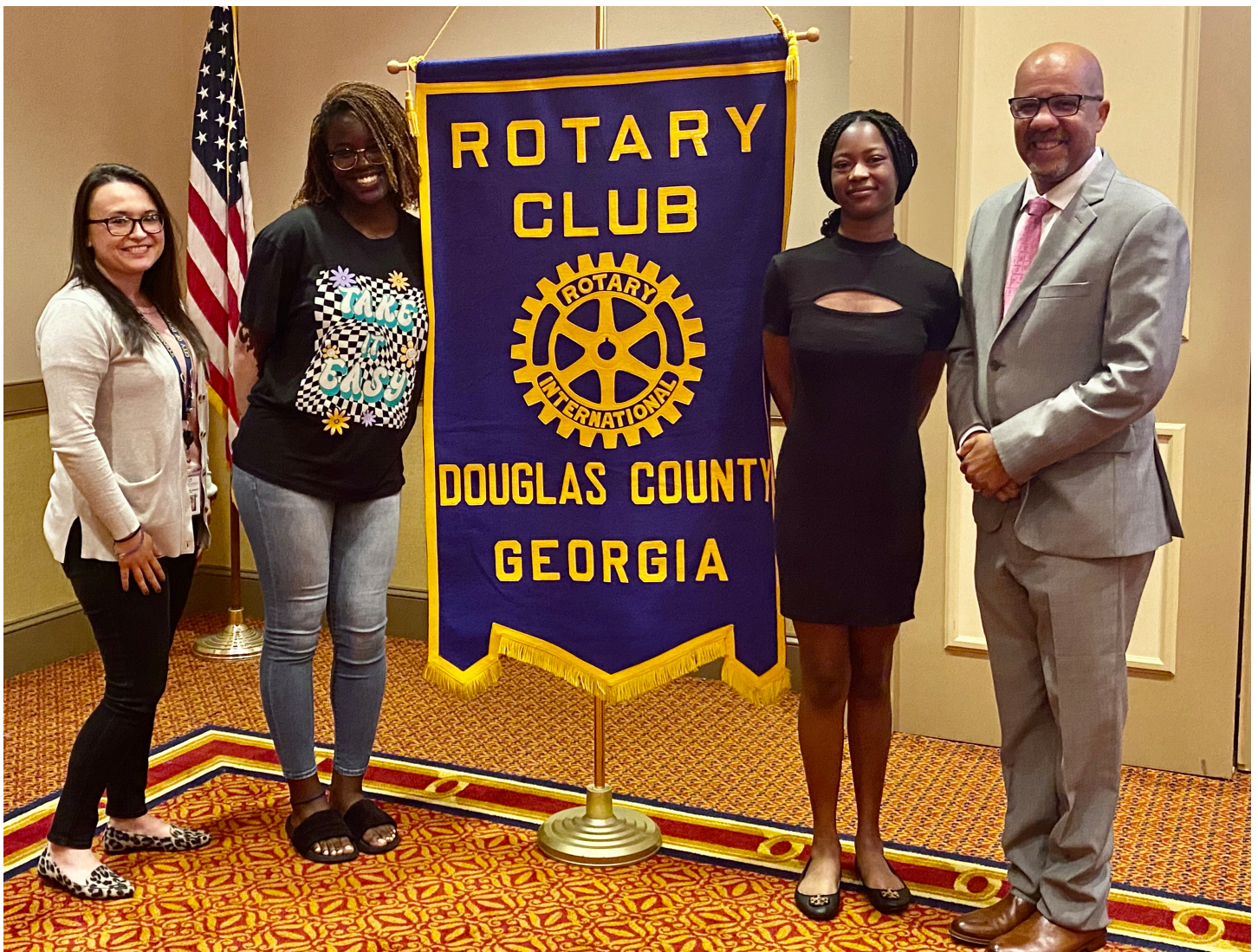

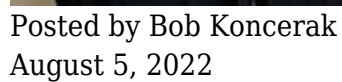

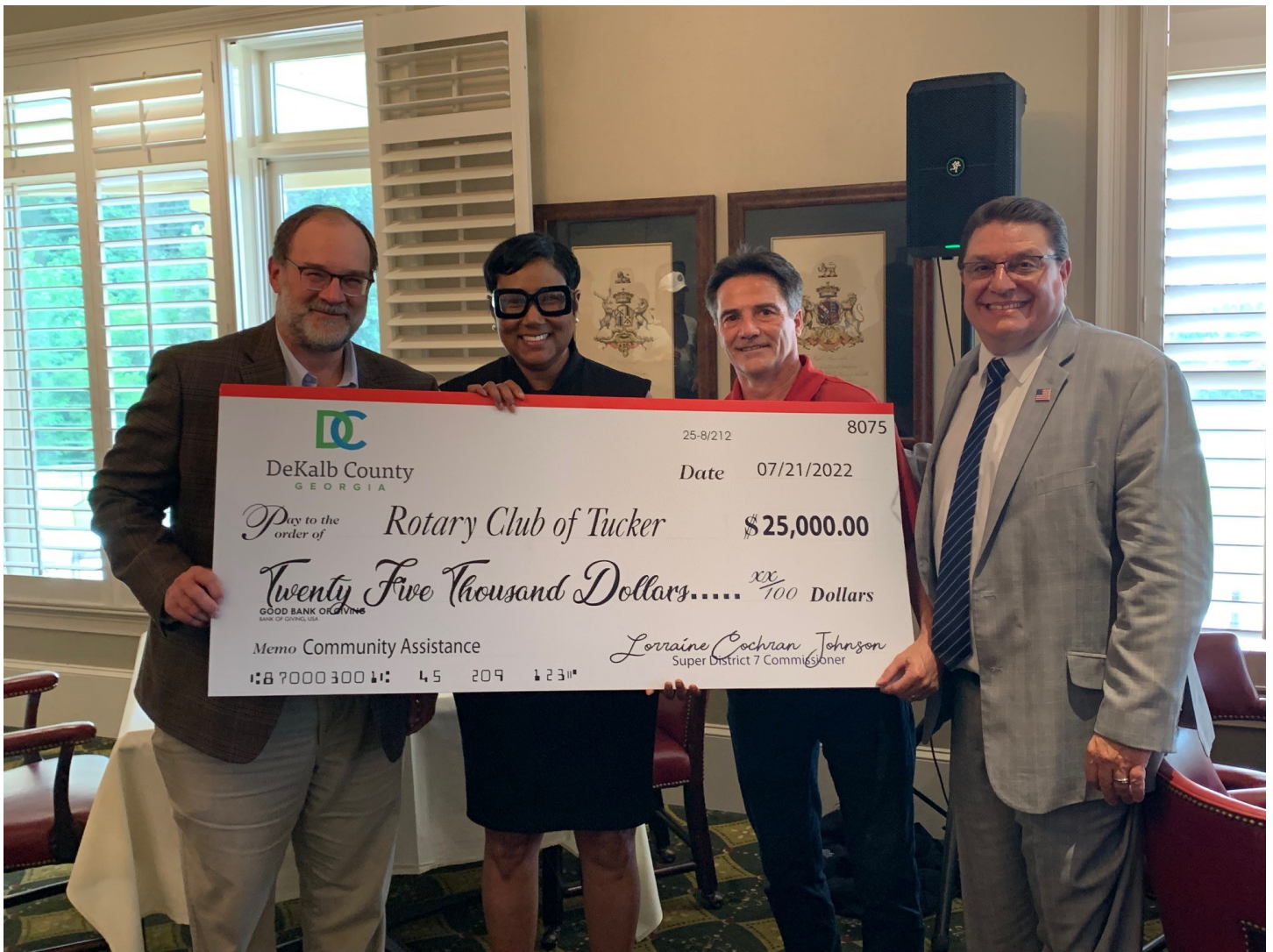

Tucker and DeKalb County Help Families Impacted by COVID

DeKalb County has approved in \$25,000 Super District 7 American Rescue Plan (ARP) funding appropriation from Commissioner Lorraine Cochran-Johnson for the **Rotary Club of Tucker** to support mortgage and rent assistance and purchase and distribute school supplies to eligible residents of the Tucker-Northlake-Embry Hills community still dealing with the financial impact from COVID.

The club will partner with NETWorks Cooperative Ministry to handle distribution of the funds and supplies. "I am extremely proud of the work the Rotary Club of Tucker does in the community," said Cochran-Johnson. "I count it a privilege to have the ability to help them further their mission of providing rental assistance, diminishing food insecurities and providing educational supplies to those who have a need."

Cochran-Johnson presented the check during the club's monthly #ThirdThursday social event at Smoke Rise Country Club in July. Kirk Fordham, Rotary Club of Tucker director of community services, expressed the club's gratitude to Cochran-Johnson for her continuing support of the club's commitment to its community. "As people of action, Rotary members want to find ways to respond to COVID-19, and to help people still being affected by it. We are grateful that the Commissioner listened to our needs and offered to help us make a transformative impact in our community."
